Why Black History Month is Still Relevant

In the wake of recent controversies, it may seem that history is repeating itself; maybe, Black History Month (BHM) doesn't change minds... Not so. Awareness erodes barriers and preconceived notions: a monthlong tribute to African Americans' contributions to society is exactly the right thing, at the right time.

It's not an easy time. Horrific events such as the deaths of Tyre Nichols, Trayvon Martin, Breonna Taylor and George Floyd, to name a few, are stoking culture wars playing out across the country.

Also consider the controversy about critical race theory (stating people who are white have benefited from ingrained racism in American institutions). How students learn about race today echoes a time when Black history was ignored in an academic framework.

In the decades after the Civil War, including the racial violence across the country following World War I, there was a concerted effort to repress the teaching of Black history. In the South, especially, topics such as Reconstruction and slavery were omitted, distorting

curricula. It wasn't until 1951 that Black history was required for public schools in one state: California.

At the university level, Black studies programs were almost nonexistent. However, largely as a result of the 1960's Civil Rights and Black Consciousness movements, higher education institutions began offering Black history courses.

And, throughout the US, public schools created courses and mandates to teach Black history, paving the way for the modern Black History Month.

Why is Black History Month in February?

In 1926, it was Carter G. Woodson (a scholar referred to as the "Father of Black History") who established Negro History Week, to focus attention on Black contributions to civilization. Woodson — the son of former enslaved people and the second Black American to earn a Harvard doctorate — famously said: "If a race has no history, if it has no worthwhile tradition, it becomes a negligible factor in the thought of the world, and it stands in danger of being exterminated." Douglass, who was born enslaved and didn't know his birth date, celebrated it on Feb. 14. Lincoln, whose birthday was Feb. 12, famously freed US slaves via 1863's Emancipation Proclamation. "Those two people were central to helping to afford Black people the experience of freedom that they have now," said W. Marvin Dulaney, president of Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), which Woodson founded in 1915; today, ASALH is the official promoter of Black History Month.

In 1976, President Gerald Ford expanded Negro History Week into a full month, stating the country needed to, "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area throughout our history." This statement still holds true. Black History Month is also celebrated in Canada in February and the United Kingdom in October.

This month enables us to challenge what we think we know, by: digging deeper to understand actual events of the past (and key figures of the present) not taught in schools or portrayed in the media. Many believe films, TV and the media showcase negatives of the Black community. Conversely, BHM celebrates leaders who contribute positive change to the world, helping to mitigate biased stereotypes.

Black History Month & Juneteenth 2023

This year's Black History Month theme is Resistance, a nod to Black Americans' historic resistance of ongoing oppression, in all forms. Learn more at asalh.org.

June 19 is known as Juneteenth: the oldest annual US holiday commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African Americans. Learn more at Juneteenth.com.

Notice of Town Election

North Brentwood will hold an election May 1 to elect a Mayor and an At-large Council Member.

Qualified candidates wishing to become mayor must be 25 years-old, or older. and have resided in North Brentwood for the past two years. One year is required for the at-large council seat.

Candidates for the mayoral seat must submit a petition with 20 signatures, of North Brentwood citizens who are registered voters, to one of the three appointed election judges (to be announced).

Candidates running for at-large council must submit a petition with 10 signatures of registered North Brentwood voters to an election judge.

The election judges certify each petition, which permits the candidate's name to be placed on the ballot. Therefore, it is advisable to get more than the stated number of signatures, in case of a problem with one or two signatures.

You are eligible to vote in the Town election if you're: a US citizen, at least 18 years of age, a resident within the corporate limits of the Town for 30 days immediately preceding the election, and a qualified PG County voter.



Honoring Thurgood Marshall

Legislation (S.3863), introduced by US Senators Ben Cardin and Chris Van Hollen, in 2020, finally passed into law — the statue of Chief Justice Roger Brooke Taney (1777–1864), at



the entrance of the US Capitol's Old Supreme Court Chamber, will be replaced with a bust of Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall. Why? Taney authored the infamous Dred Scott decision ruling African-Americans were not US citizens and Congress could not prohibit slavery. Justice Marshall was the first African-American to serve on the nation's highest court.

Senator Cardin stated:

Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall is an inspiration, a person who propelled his rise from West Baltimore to the highest court in the country through hard work, intellectual evolution and unwavering morality. A civil rights icon, Thurgood Marshall argued cases that began to bring down the walls of segregation in his home state and nationwide. Among other landmark cases, his arguments in Murray vs. Pearson led to the desegregation of the University of Maryland School of Law and his arguments in Brown vs. Board of Education led this nation to recognize that the doctrine of 'separate but equal' was antithetical to our ideals of freedom and liberty. I can think of no better person for us to highlight and celebrate in the US Capitol.

Senator Van Hollen added:

As our country continues to grapple with the past and future of civil rights and systemic racism, we should highlight leaders in history that have propelled us towards justice and put an end to the glorification of those who stood in its way. From his neighborhood in Baltimore to the halls of the Supreme Court, Thurgood Marshall worked his entire life to help build civil rights in America from the ground up. Marshall's work is a crucial reminder that we must continue pressing

forward. His steadfast legacy should be memorialized in the Halls of Congress and never forgotten.

In 2017, a statue of Taney was removed from the grounds of the Maryland State House in Annapolis, per order of then-Governor Hogan.

North Brentwood is accepting applications from residents for rental/mortgage and/or utility assistance. Our Residential Assistance program provides temporary relief to all eligible applicants who've experienced financial hardship during the pandemic.

Currently, North Brentwood pays a maximum of \$2,000 for rental/mortgage help and/or utility assistance. Approved households will be able to reapply for more assistance in the future, pending available funds.

Winter Weather & Pet Safety

Exposure to extreme winter weather can harm our pets, if we leave or take them outside for a prolonged period.

Prince George's County law states: "All domestic animals, except livestock, are prohibited



from being kept outdoors when the effective outdoor wind chill index is 32 degrees Fahrenheit."

For their safety, ensure four-legged family members are kept warm and their paws are clear of snow/ice.

When left unattended outdoors, pets can get frostbite, or become disoriented, and freeze to death. What is more, hypothermia, which is life-threatening, may result from extended exposure to cold.

If there are outdoor cats in your area, bang loudly on your car hood before starting the engine to give cats a

chance to escape. Cats like to seek shelter from the cold and may be under your car's hood.

Stay Alert

Thefts of auto airbags are on the rise across the country and we're seeing thefts here at home, too. The steps you can take, to help protect your vehicle from airbag theft, are the same for preventing your car from being broken into or stolen:



- Use a steering wheel lock every time you park
- Park in well-lit areas in public
- Keep your porch light on when parking at home
- Use home surveillance video for parking areas
- Have an alarm system with glass-break sensors

Waste Collection

Warning: Properly discarding waste is important to our community safety. Remember, it's imperative bulk trash, recycling and/or yard waste doesn't sit outside before collection time; you may be fined \$100 if you fail to comply. In addition, all mattresses and box springs are to be wrapped in plastic.

Hyattsville Bicycle-Pedestrian Route Project



2023 Project Update No. 5

All work is performed as permitted barring emergencies and manpower shortages.

(Construction equipment may be disruptive.)

- Reconstruction of full-depth asphalt for widening road, at the median of US-1, between Braxton Place and Charles Armentrout Drive.
- Installation of two manholes, near the intersection of 42nd Place and Charles Armentrout Drive.
- Placing concrete for five-foot sidewalk, ramps, curb and gutter at the intersection of 41st Place and US-1.

Looking ahead:

- Reinforced concrete pipe installation at the intersection of Charles Armentrout Drive and northbound of US-1.
- The concrete for signal foundation will be poured.
- Installation of standard ten-foot COG (Curb Opening Grate) inlets throughout trail road network.

Lane closures:

- MDOT SHA maintaining one through-lane traffic, and one northbound lane closure, on US 1 (Rhode Island Ave) for the duration of this accessibility project.
- MDOT SHA maintaining intermittent single southbound lane closures, weekdays, 9 am to 5 pm.

Helpful Tips when Shoveling Snow

Warm up with gentle stretches before shoveling.

Out of shape or overweight?

- Tackle snow shoveling at a slow pace, to avoid the risk of a heart attack.
- Push snow out of your way instead of lifting it, whenever possible.



- Take small loads of snow on your shovel.
- Bend your knees, keep your back straight and lift with your legs. Keep your arms close to your body when lifting a load.

Take frequent breaks:

- Stand up and walk around to reduce strain on lower back.
- Extend/stretch your back muscles.
- Place your hands on the back of hips; slightly, gently bend backwards - do not bounce.

Be Prepared Even in Your Car

Before taking a winter trip, tell someone where you're going, intended route and expected arrival time. Keep your gas tank full to prevent gas line freeze-up. Have an emergency kit in the car with:

- * Jumper cables
- * Roadside flares
- * Window ice scraper
- Blanket or sleeping bag
- * Extra pair of gloves
- * Fresh water and high-energy food
- * Heat pads made for hunting
- * Candles/matches in weather-tight container
- * Cellphone, CB, or emergency calling device
- * Flashlight with fresh batteries
- * Pencil and notepad for messages
- * Small shovel
- * Traction items (bag of sand, cat liter and mats)






Senior Call Check



If you're symptomatic, you may also want to consider using the Test to Treat program. With thousands of locations nationwide, it can provide fast, easy access to lifesaving COVID-19 treatments. If you test positive, see a healthcare provider; and, if eligible, get a prescription for an oral COVID-19 medication and have that prescription filled — all at one location.
