2023 North Brentwood Municipal Election: May 1

Cast your ballot on May 1, 2023, to elect a Mayor and an At-large Council Member. Polling location will be at the Town Office, 4009 Wallace Rd, from 1 pm to 7 pm. Election Judges Connie Alexander, Paulette Price and Yvonne Howard have certified each petition for Town Office. This certification permits candidates' names to be placed on the ballot. Unopposed nominees are: Petrella Robinson, for Mayor, and Aaron Baynes for Ward II Council.



Mayoral Candidate

Petrella Robinson has been North Brentwood's Mayor since 2007! She was raised in North Brentwood and is an active member of North Brentwood

Citizens Association, North Brentwood Historical Society, and Maryland Black Mayors. Mayor Robinson is also a board member of Prince George's Arts and Humanities Council, and Prince George's County Municipal Association.



Council Candidate

Aaron Baynes moved his family to North Brentwood in 1993. He was first elected to the Town's Council in 2007 and serves as Vice-Mayor, when

the Mayor is absent. Council member Baynes is fond of our Town, and he is known for his empathic support of every citizen. This month, he cautions residents to watch speeds, as warmer weather arises and more children are playing outside.

Voting in Town Elections

You are eligible to vote in the Town election if you are: a US citizen, at least 18 years of age; a resident (within the corporate limits of the Town for 30 days immediately preceding the election); and a qualified PG County voter. Meanwhile, North Brentwood residents, especially new ones, should check with the County Board of Elections to ensure they're registered: voterservices.elections.maryland.gov/votersearch.

If you cannot vote in person, obtain an absentee ballot. Please contact Town Board of Elections Supervisor, Constance Alexander, 301.864.9077, to receive an application asap. After your application is received, you will be given further instructions. For more information call Carl Jones, Town Clerk – 301.699.9699.



Mayor & Council Meetings

Monday, March 6, 2023

Financial Reports — for the month ending January 31 were read by Treasurer Dorsey. A motion to accept the financial reports, subject to audit, was presented by Councilman Dame and seconded by Councilman Baynes. All in Favor. No Discussion. Motion Passed.

Monday, March 20, 2023

Minutes — include motions to accept the February 6 and February 21 meeting minutes (with necessary corrections), brought forth by Councilmember Dame and seconded by Councilmember Baynes. All in favor. Motions Passed.

Resolution 2023-01

Connected Devices Grant

Town Manager Goodall applied for a grant that could help connect North Brentwood residents to the internet. If awarded the grant, 30 computers will be distributed to qualifying residents. Town Manager Goodall will also coordinate with internet providers to help residents install devices and enroll them in the internet assistance financial program.

Councilman Wiley presented a motion to waive the reading of Resolution 2023-01 in its entirety, given that Town Manager Goodall provided a detailed overview of the grant. Seconded by Councilperson Baynes. No discussion. All in favor. Motion Passed.

A motion, by Councilperson Wiley, to introduce Resolution 2023-01, was presented and seconded by Councilman Baynes. All in favor. Motion Passed.





Earth Month raises awareness about learning to live in ways that sustain the planet's resources. Here are 10 small everyday changes that make a difference (this month and all year) and cost absolutely nothing:

Conserve energy at home. Turn off lights, power strips and electronics when not in use. Use a programmable thermostat. Change your air filter regularly. These actions reduce greenhouse gas

regularly. These actions reduce greenhouse gas emissions, while saving money on your utility bills.

Reduce paper waste. Think twice before printing things at work and home. Also opt-out of mailings in favor of email notifications for your bills.

 Recycle electronics for free. Save natural resources and reduce pollution by recycling old or broken computers, tablets, phones, and other electronics. Contact stores, manufacturers and PG County.

Give your car a break. When possible, leave your car at home: carpool, walk, ride a bike, or take public transportation. You'll save money, reduce greenhouse gas emissions and get more exercise.

 Turn off the water. Whether you're brushing your
 teeth, washing dishes, or taking a shower, turn off the water when it's not needed.



Bring your own bags. Use a backpack, plastic bags or buy reusable bags to use again and again.

Go on a beach clean. If you want to help get rid of some of the plastic waste in your area, going on a beach clean is a great and fun way to do this.

 Organize trash pickup days. Gather with friends to beautify your community by picking up trash. Take breaks, bring a picnic... make it an event.

Buy local. Fresh produce and locally-made items (e.g., candles) use less/no plastic packaging vs. supermarkets (which reduces waste). Shopping 'local' also supports areas businesses and reduces CO2 emissions via shorter transport needs.

Cleanup: Celebrating Earth Day 2023



Join your neighbors by volunteering on April 22 2023, from 10 am to noon, for **North Brentwood's Earth Day 2023 Community Cleanup**. The annual event is held in collaboration with the county's Department of the Environment.

Each year, on April 22, the world celebrates Earth Day as part of the modern environmental movement, which gained momentum in the 1960s. Earthday.org coordinates global Earth Day events attended by one billion people in 190-plus countries.

The 2023 Earth Day theme is "Invest In Our Planet," which highlights the importance of dedicating time and resources to slowing climate change and solving other environmental issues. The 2023 campaign focuses on each person's power to safeguard our planet. Truly, every day, as a consumer, you wield real power for change: informed decisions (e.g., spending choices and supporting green legislation) promote sustainability by reducing your carbon footprint.

When your voice and actions are united with millions around the world, you become part of an impactful movement that will be impossible to ignore. Join in on April 22 and treat every day like it's Earth Day!



How You Can Create A Pollinator Garden



Pollination is vital for a strong ecosystem, and needs year-around effort. Did you know... one in three bites of food you eat depends on pollinators?!

To construct pollinator gardens, use varied colors, shapes and heights of plants, and include plants that flower throughout the growing season to provide nectar and pollen. You don't need a large yard or a big budget. Even a few plants will help. Helpful tips:

- In addition to nectar plants, provide host plants and habitats for reproduction, winter shelter and lifecycle completion. Some pollinators/beneficial insects need the shelter of perennial plants that grow in: untilled areas; woody plant material (e.g., unused firewood or dead branches); and undisturbed soil in areas not mowed/cultivated.
- Avoid planting invasive species like butterfly bush.
 Alternatives include blazing star (Liatris spicata),
 New York ironweed (Vernonia noveboracensis),
 and butterfly weed (Asclepias tuberosa).
- Add a water source (e.g., small pond) in or near a pollinator garden. Consider a dish or birdbath; change water every other day to prevent mosquitoes from breeding.
- Do not use yard or garden pesticides. Learn to tolerate some damage; control pests naturally.

Prince George's County Rain Check Rebate

Chesapeake Bay Trust is partnering with PG County on its Rain Check Rebate Program. The program offers rebate incentives to homeowners, businesses and others, to improve stormwater runoff quality (reducing pollutions and improving local stream and river health).

7 stormwater options eligible for rebate: rain barrels, cisterns, rain gardens, urban tree canopies, pavement removal, permeable pavement, and green roofs.

Eligibility: An applicant must be the property owner or a nonprofit organization with an agreement to complete a project on public property. Applicants are not eligible for this program if the project is part of the permit-approval requirements for new building construction or renovations.

For nonprofits working with owners, to install Rain Check Rebate practices on residential property, go to cbtrust.org/rain-check-for-nonprofit-organizations.

Maximum rebate amounts: Each practice supported by the program has a rebate allowance based on the project type and size. A project must meet the criteria and minimum size requirements to qualify for a rebate. The total maximum rebate amount for the lifetime of the property is \$6,000 for residential properties and \$20,000 for commercial, industrial and institutional properties. An applicant may complete multiple projects until the maximum rebate amount is met.

Funds are available on a first come, first served basis; demand for the program this fiscal year has been high.

Deadline: Application acceptance is ongoing/rolling.



2023 Tax Season

The April 18 tax deadline is near. If you're not ready, file for an automatic extension to October 16. Remember, it is not an extension to pay; avoid penalties by including a payment. And if you're self-employed, don't forget first-quarter estimated payments are due April 18, too.

Filing an extension is simple and free. You'll need to provide your name, address, Social Security number, estimated tax liability, and payment if applicable. Regardless of your income, use "Free File" to request an automatic six-month extension: irs.gov/filing/free-fileeveryone-can-file-an-extension-for-free.

Special Health Coverage Enrollment

Open enrollment at Maryland Health Connection ended in January. However, *if you haven't filed your taxes yet, don't miss a special chance to enroll in a health plan*! Simply check the box on your MD state tax form.

The Maryland Health Benefit Exchange (the agency that runs Maryland Health Connection) will estimate your coverage eligibility. If you file taxes by April 18, this launches an easy process to help you enroll. Learn more at: marylandhealthconnection.gov/easyenrollment/ #GetCoveredMD.



April is Flood Awareness Month



Yes, we had Flood Awareness Week in March, but April is dedicated to flood prevention. Flooding is our state's top natural

hazard: from the mountains in the west, across the Piedmont, and down to the coastal plain extending to the Atlantic. You don't have to live near the water for your home or business to flood.

As climate change accelerates, flooding can come from regular rainfall, a tropical storm, winter ice melt that swells rivers, high tide overflow, or broken pipes. Be prepared! Use "Know, Plan, Act" to lessen flooding's impact on your family and community.

Before an Emergency

- Build an emergency kit.
- Make a family communications plan.
- Contact a local emergency manager to see if your home sits in a floodplain. If it does, consider elevating and reinforcing your home.
- Make sure your insurance policy covers flooding. Even renters are eligible for flood insurance.
- Elevate the furnace, water heater and electric panel in your home if in a high flood risk area.

During an Emergency

- Listen to the radio or local news for information.
- If you have time, bring in outdoor furniture and move essential items to an upper floor.
- Do not walk through moving water. Six inches of moving water can make you fall. If you have to walk in water, go where water is not moving. Use a stick to check ground firmness in front of you.
- Do not drive into flooded areas. If floodwaters rise around your car, abandon the car and move to higher ground if you can do so safely. You and the vehicle can be swept away quickly.

- Avoid floodwaters; water may be contaminated by oil, gasoline or raw sewage.
- Service damaged septic tanks, cesspools, pits, and leaching systems; these can pose serious health hazards if not fixed properly.
- Follow your local news and emergency personnel's instructions regarding safe water consumption.
- Clean and disinfect everything that got wet. Mud left from floodwater can contain sewage, bacteria and chemicals.
- Use caution when entering buildings; there may be hidden damage, particularly in foundations.
- Remember, floodwaters sometimes take days to rise, even when the sun is shining. It can take days for floodwaters to flow downstream.

Don't underestimate the power and speed with which flood waters can rise and destroy everything in its path.
