
Do I Have to Register for Each Election?

Registration is permanent as long as the voter keeps their address current with the Board of Elections.

Change of Address

Notify the Board of Elections within 30 days of any change of address. If you changed your address through the MVA, the Elections Board is notified. Not sure? *Elections.maryland.gov/Voting/address* has the info you need to make sure you go to the correct polling place. North Brentwood citizens vote at Brentwood's Town Hall at 4300 39th Place.

As he was honored with the CBC Lifetime Achievement award, President Biden noted the CBC's

actions have bolstered his administration's achievements: "With the CBC, we went big and we went bold and we are better off today than we were four years ago. I'm being very sincere when I say a big reason why is because Congress boasts the highest number of Black members in American history." October is
Breast Cancer
Awareness
Month, an
annual global
campaign to
raise awareness

and to fund research for causes, treatment and cure.

Most people diagnosed with breast cancer have no symptoms, so be vigilant about detection. If you notice breast/armpit changes, such as a new lump, swelling or thickening of part of the breast, or irritation, dimpling, redness or flaking of skin, consult your doctor. Building awareness is an effective way to decrease breast cancer-related deaths. Be aware of your family history, get frequent mammograms per your doctor's recommendations, and ask for genetic testing (to check for BRCA1/BRCA2 gene mutations) for early diagnosis and life-saving treatment. The risk of developing breast cancer can be reduced through education and prevention, e.g.: quitting smoking and avoiding other carcinogens, healthy diet and exercise habits, taking medications to treat precancerous conditions or prevent the onset of certain cancers, and limiting postmenopausal hormone therapy. Who is most at risk? The median age of breast cancer diagnosis is 62; but, some are younger than 45. Overall, the average risk of a woman in the US developing breast cancer in her lifetime is about 13%, or 1 in 8. In recent years, incidences have increased by 0.6% per year, with a steeper rise in women younger than 50 (1.0%). The good news: breast cancer death rates have decreased 42% since 1989, as a result of early detection, through screening and increased awareness, as well as better treatments. However, the decline has slowed slightly in recent years.

Breast cancer varies in racial and ethnic groups:

- The median age at diagnosis is younger for Black women (60 years old) vs. White women (64 years).
- Black women have the highest breast cancer death rate, partly from a higher risk of triple-negative breast cancer, the most of any racial/ethnic group.
- White, Asian and Pacific Islander women are more often diagnosed with localized cancer than Black/ Hispanic/American Indian/Alaska Native women.

Maryland. Alsobrooks wants to change that: "Challenges in education, awareness, clinical testing, early detection, and screenings are holding us back from being a County



where we envision no breast cancer. We ask you – whether you're a survivor or supporter to join us as Prince George's Goes Pink (PGGP)."

National Fire Prevention Week: Oct 8—14

National Fire Prevention Week's 2024 theme, "Cooking Safety Starts with YOU," emphasizes the importance of safe cooking habits to prevent home fires.

Why Focus on Cooking Safety? According to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), cooking is the leading cause of home fires and related injuries in the US. Most of these fires start when people leave cooking unattended or when they handle cooking equipment unsafely.

Key Fire Prevention Tips

- Never leave cooking unattended. Turn off the stove if you eave the kitchen.
- Keep flammable objects away. Ensure
 a safe distance between cooking appliances and items like towels, oven mitts, sprays, or paper.
- **Use timers.** Set timers to remind you of cooking times, especially when using the oven or stovetop.
- Have an extinguisher. Keep a fire extinguisher nearby in case of emergencies; make sure everyone in the household knows how to use it.
- Stop grease fires. Cover flames with a metal lid;
 turn off burner. Don't pour water on grease fires!
- Install smoke alarms. Put smoke detectors on each level of your home; test monthly.
- Create a fire escape plan. Plan and practice a fire escape route with your family. Make sure everyone

- knows how to exit the house quickly in an emergency, and where to meet outside.
- Check electrical cords. Inspect appliances and cords for damage; replace if frayed or damaged.

Keeping sidewalks clear is crucial for maintaining safe and accessible public spaces for pedestrians. In residential and commercial areas, keep sidewalks obstruction-free to ensure everyone can walk safely, including those with mobility challenges, parents with strollers, and children.

Why It's Important to Keep Sidewalks Clear:

Safety. Obstructed sidewalks can force pedestrians to walk on the street, increasing the risk of accidents with cars. Clear sidewalks provide a safer route for everyone.

Accessibility. An obstructed sidewalk can be a significant barrier for people with disabilities, particularly those using wheelchairs, scooters, or walkers.

Cleanliness and aesthetics. Removing waste bins/clutter from sidewalks maintains a clean, attractive environment and helps prevent littering or illegal dumping around bins.


Keeping Sidewalks Clear of Waste Bins:

Timely removal. Waste bins should only be on sidewalks at pickup times and removed after collection.

Proper placement. Place waste bins as close to the curb as possible, without blocking the pedestrian path. Ensure there's enough space for people to pass by safely.

Report obstructions. If you notice consistent violations or hazardous obstructions, report it to me at the Town Office.

From the Christmas in April Team

Christmas in April is a one-day event dedicated to repairing homes for those who, due to age, disability, or financial hardship, are unable to perform the work. The 2025 Christmas in April workday is scheduled for Saturday, April 26, 2025. We anticipate completing our 3000th home during the 2025 program.



Our program relies on the generous contributions of time and money, from skilled and unskilled volunteers, who devote many hours to help make a difference in our community. While our volunteers can assist with a wide range of minor home repairs, please note we're unable to replace roofs, repair or replace concrete, or install new windows.

However, we can perform minor repairs on existing roofs. If you require a new roof, structural repairs, or any projects that cannot be completed within a single day, we suggest contacting the Department of Housing, at 301.883.5570, for help.

To be considered for this program, the home must be owned and occupied by the homeowner, who must be elderly and/or disabled. While there are no strict income requirements, we prioritize applicants who lack the resources to make necessary repairs themselves.

Please keep in mind repairs will be limited to the last Saturday in April, and while we strive to meet all needs, we cannot guarantee every requested repair will be completed. Typical repairs include interior and exterior painting, minor carpentry, plumbing and electrical work, replacing non-functional appliances, and general clean-up and yard work.

Applications must be submitted to our office by November 1, 2024. If you are applying on behalf of someone, or making a referral, please be sure to discuss it with the homeowner beforehand and gather as much of the required info as possible. Please include your name, your relationship to the homeowner, and your contact numbers.

As part of the application process, a Christmas in April volunteer will conduct an onsite visit to ensure requested repairs fall within the program's scope. You can expect a call in mid-November to arrange this visit. We anticipate final selections by early January. Applicants will be notified in writing, regardless of whether they've been selected for the 2025 program.

TO REGISTER, YOU MUST

- Be a U.S. citizen;
- Be a Maryland resident;
- Be at least 16 years old*;
- Not be under guardianship for mental disability or if you are, you have not been found by a court to be unable to communicate a desire to vote;
- Not have been convicted of buying or selling votes;
- Not be currently serving a sentence of imprisonment for a felony conviction.

*You may register to vote if you are at least 16 years old but cannot vote unless you will be at least 18 years old by the next general election.

DEADLINE INFORMATION

- This application must be postmarked no later than 21 days before an election.
- If your application is complete and you are found to be qualified, a Voter Notification Card will be mailed to you.
- The submission of this form to an individual other than an official, employee, or agent of a County Board of Elections does not assure that the form will be submitted or filed in a timely manner.

YOU CAN USE THIS FORM TO

- Register to vote in federal, state, county, and municipal elections in Maryland.
- Change your name, address, or party affiliation.

INSTRUCTIONS

- If you do not have a current, valid Maryland driver's license, Learner's Permit or MVA ID card, you must enter the last 4 digits of your social security number. The statutory authority allowing officials to request the last 4 digits of your social security number is Election Law Article, § 3-202. The number will only be used for registration and other administrative purposes. It will be kept confidential.
- Complete Items 1–11 in Voter Registration Application. Sign and date Item 12. If you are registered to vote in another Maryland county or another state, you must complete Items A–B in Last Voter Registration.
- You must register with a party if you want to take part in that party's primary election, caucus or convention. Check one box only.
- Detach this panel at the perforation.
- Address and mail the application to your County Board of Elections, using the list on the back panel.

WARNING

Giving false information on an application for voter registration is perjury, punishable by imprisonment for up to 10 years, and a violation of the election laws, punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000, or by imprisonment for up to 5 years, or both.

PERSONAL RECORDS NOTICE/CONFIDENTIALITY

This form collects personal information for voter registration purposes. If you are not registered to vote and you refuse to provide this information, you will not be allowed to vote in Maryland. You may update your voter registration at any time at your County Board of Elections. Except for items specified as confidential, voter registration records are generally available for public inspection; they may also be shared with jury commissioners/clerks or other government agencies as provided by law. The law prohibits use of voter registration records for commercial solicitation purposes. If you decline to register to vote, that fact will remain confidential and will be used only for voter registration purposes.

If you register to vote, the identity of the office at which the application is submitted will remain confidential and will be used only for voter registration purposes.

The Maryland Safe at Home Address Confidentiality Program (ACP) is administered by the Office of the Secretary of State and provides an important service to victims of domestic violence and human trafficking. For more information about this Program please call 1-800-633-9657, ext. 3875.


