Keep North Brentwood Clean!

Get Ready for Fall!!

Clean Gutters: Remove leaves and debris from gutters to prevent water damage from

clogs. Consider installing gutter guards.

Seal Air Leaks: Inspect windows/doors for drafts and apply weather stripping or caulk to seal any gaps.

Check Heating System: Schedule a maintenance check for your HVAC to ensure it's functioning properly before cold weather sets in. Clean filters improve efficiency.

Prepare Yard: Trim overgrown shrubs, rake leaves, and prepare your garden for winter. Transplant any crowded plants to ensure these thrive in cooler months.

Inspect Roof and Chimney: Check for, and clear, any damage or debris. If any shingles are missing, have these replaced before winter snow.

Elevate Utilities: Raise electrical components, such as switches and sockets, at least 12 inches above projected flood elevations. Relocate or elevate washers/dryers.

Seal Vulnerable Areas: Identify and seal openings and cracks in foundations/walls, where water could seep in.

Install Flood Barriers: Use sandbags or install flood walls around your home to prevent water entry via doors and windows. Get sandbags from behind the Town office.

Maintain Drainage Systems: Regularly inspect and clean gutters, downspouts, and yard drainage systems, to ensure these function properly and direct water away from your home.

Direct water flow to drain on **your property**, not the neighbor's yard, nor the street.

Essential Supplies: Water, non-perishable foods, first aid kit, flashlights with batteries, medication... Make sure you have enough supplies to last for three days.

And, remember, to have buckets, mops and flashlights to handle any flooding inside, as well as rainy weather gear, such as boots, raincoats and gloves to brave the elements outside!



North Brentwood Town Council Meeting Highlights – September 2, 2025

The North Brentwood Town Council held its first regular meeting of the fall, on Tuesday, September 2, with Mayor Petrella Robinson presiding. The meeting began at 7:31 pm, with a moment of silent prayer asking for humility, peace and love throughout our nation.

Town Business

The Council approved the minutes from June 2 and June 16 meetings, with necessary corrections.

Assistant Clerk Cristian Ortiz-Romero presented FY25 financial reports through July 31, 2025, which were accepted subject to audit.

Mayor's Report

Mayor Robinson shared updates from recent initiatives:

- Meeting with Truist Bank about interest rates and secure digital payments.
- Successful National Night Out celebration.
- Visit to a new digital creation shop in the area.
- Literacy programming at summer playgrounds.
- Transition of the Town's email system to secure cloud storage.

Council Updates

Councilperson Morales (Ward I): Announced upcoming scholarship opportunities.

Councilperson Baynes (Ward II): Spoke about current political and social issues.

Councilperson Dame (Ward III): Reported positive financial news from Gateway CDC under the guidance of Executive Director Michelle Darden-Lee.

Special Guest Charles Fenwick, a longtime music industry professional, shared his life story and emphasized the need for positive role models in the community. He encouraged CPR and first aid training for young people, recommending refresher courses every three months. Mayor Robinson suggested organizing CPR and fire safety classes at the Community Center; residents expressed interest in collaboration.

Citizen Concerns & Old Business

A resident raised yard waste collection questions; the Mayor will follow up with the provider.

The Cat Rescue TNR program has continued on 40th Street, with future flyers planned to promote discounted spay and neuter services. The Mayor encouraged improved communication and scheduling updates from the rescue organization.

- North Brentwood Day will be celebrated next year on June 20, 2026 (12 pm to 5 pm); volunteers and contributions are welcomed.
- Color-Me-Fridays: Weekly events in September at Sis's Tavern/Mural Park (Fridays, 6 to 8 pm) with music, vendors and a time capsule sealing ceremony.
- NBCA Membership Drive: Residents are encouraged to volunteer and join the Citizens Association.
- **SHARE Program**: Budgeted expenses have increased creating a shortfall. The Town is seeking partners to help meet the need.

Renters' Tax Credit Program

Maryland's Renters' Tax Credit Program gives property tax reimbursement to low-income renters meeting requirements. The concept: renters indirectly pay property taxes as part of their rent and thus should have some financial protection, as do homeowners.

Most rental types qualify: an apartment in a house or building, duplex, co-op, condo, trailer, or mobile home pad. If the portion of rent attributable to the assumed property taxes exceeds a fixed amount (relative to income), the renter may receive a credit of up to \$1,000, paid as a direct check from the State of Maryland.

The plan was modeled after the Homeowners' Tax Credit Program, which is known to many as the Circuit Breaker Program. For info, and to apply, go to dat.maryland.gov/realproperty/pages/renters%27-tax-credits.aspx.

News You Can Use: Beware of Al Voice-Cloning Scams

Technology keeps improving—but so do scams.

Criminals now use artificial intelligence (AI) to copy voices, with startling accuracy. In just seconds, scammers can impersonate a loved one, a boss, a government agency,

or a service provider.

The Numbers Tell the Story

- One in four adults worldwide reports experiencing an AI voice scam, and 10% say it happened directly to them (artsmart.ai).
- Of those targeted, 77% lost money—more than a third lost \$1,000-plus, and some lost \$5,000 or more (artsmart.ai).
- In 2023, older Americans lost \$3.4 billion to scams, with AI voice-cloning making fraud harder to detect (CBS News). Note: this was two years ago!
- On Long Island in 2023, more than 3,000 Al voice scams cost victims \$126 million (*New York Post*).
- Cyber-fraud losses overall hit \$16.6 billion in 2024, fueled by realistic Al-driven scams (*Investopedia*).
- In 2024 alone, more than 105,000 deep-fake attacks (e.g., voice scams) were reported, with \$200 million lost in the first quarter (Wall Street Journal).

Why these Scams Work

Scammers use urgency and familiarity. If you hear what sounds like your child or grandchild in trouble, your instinct is to help quickly. Experts warn that this emotional manipulation is exactly what makes voice cloning so dangerous (*CoVantage Credit Union*; *Webster First Credit Union*).

How to Protect Yourself and Your Family

- Use a family code word, a password only family members know and use to confirm if the caller is real (TNSi; New York Post).
- Don't speak first when answering calls from unknown numbers. Even a few seconds of your

- voice can be recorded, cloned and used for fraudulent schemes (*TNSi*; *The Sun*).
- Limit what you post online. Social media clips or voicemails give scammers material (Webster First).
- Avoid personal voicemail greetings. Use default voicemail messages instead (TNSi).
- Verify independently. If someone requests money or sensitive information, call them back on a known number before acting (*Investopedia*).
- Pause before acting. Scammers count on panic. Take a breath and question the urgency, and validity, of a call before responding (*CoVantage*).

Tips for Businesses

- Train employees to recognize sudden, urgent or secretive requests (Wall Street Journal).
- Require multi-step approval for financial transactions.
- Use secure communication channels and confirm identities through trusted methods.

Eleven Local Residents Graduate from Free Auto Tech Apprenticeship Program



The Washington Area New Automobile Dealers Association (WANADA)'s Auto Dealer Education Institute (ADEI)—a free, two-year apprenticeship—is celebrating the graduation of eleven local residents who have completed hands-on training to become professional automotive technicians.

ADEI, funded and operated under WANADA, offers participants a unique paid learning experience. From day one, apprentices are placed with participating dealerships. There, they receive mentorship, on-the-job training and a paycheck—while attending classes once a week at one of ADEI's three training sites located in: Rockville, MD; Camp Springs, MD; and Alexandria, VA.

Over the past two decades, the program produced more than 600 technician graduates, working with nearly 200 new-car dealerships throughout the DC Metro area. It also holds accreditation from the ASE (Automotive Service Excellence), paving a clear path toward ASE-certified master technician status after program completion.

Participants typically work five days per week, earning an average starting wage of \$16 to \$17 per hour, depending on prior experience. Those with no automotive background are encouraged to apply. ADEI welcomes anyone with interest, work ethic, and a team-oriented attitude.

For those considering other roles in the dealership environment, ADEI also assists in placements

beyond technician roles, including careers in sales, parts, finance, and insurance.

Harold Fox: North Brentwood Hardwood Legend

From Our Town To the Spotlight

Fifty years ago, Northwestern High's Harold Fox played a game to remember: scoring 64 points in a 103-87 victory over Oxon Hill. The game's dramatic finish, and Fox's exceptional scoring ability, made this one of the greatest

single-game performances in the history of regional high school ball.

Fox, who was raised in North Brentwood, emerged from Northwestern High School, a school that has long been a



cradle for exceptional talent. Standing at 6-foot-2 and playing guard, Fox was widely considered among the best local players of his time.

High School Triumphs & Record-breaking Feats

As a junior, Fox helped lead the Northwestern Wildcats to a MD State Championship, alongside captain and center Mark Christian. By his senior year, Fox earned first-team All-Metropolitan honors and guided Northwestern to a second consecutive State championship, after Christian graduated. His outstanding performance also earned Fox the title of High School Player of the Year in the Washington metro area in 1968.

But Harold's greatness didn't stop with titles. In the aforementioned legendary showdown against Oxon Hill, he pulled down 15 rebounds, and dished out 13 assists— all within a 32-minute high school game, no three-point line, no shot clock. He averaged 31 points per game his senior year and became a rare three-time first-team All-Met selection, a feat even Len Bias did not achieve. In the his last State final, Fox cemented his legacy: 21 points, 21 rebounds and 7 assists, securing another title.

College & Briefly the NBA

After high school, Fox played at Brevard Community College, now Eastern Florida State College, where he averaged 27.7 points per game and earned NJCAA Third Team All-America recognition. He then transferred to Jacksonville University, averaging 19.9 points and 6.5 assists per game over two seasons.

In the 1972 NBA Draft, Fox was a second-round pick (15th pick overall) of the Buffalo Braves. He appeared in 10 games that season, averaging 3.1 points, 1.0 assists, and 0.8 rebounds per game. He was waived mid-December 1972; that same month he signed with the Eastern Basketball Association's Scranton Apollos.

A North Brentwood Icon

Harold Fox's success is more than just personal accomplishment—it reflects the strength of North Brentwood's community spirit and dedication to nurturing youth. His journey from local courts to state championships, college basketball, and the NBA embodies what makes our Town proud.

Cultural Legacy & Community Identity

Northwesterners, like Fox, remind us how community support, teamwork, and athletic excellence can push

individuals to incredible heights. His legacy is a cornerstone of local heritage: an example for current students and inspired athletes at Northwestern High and beyond.



Harold Fox's story is not just about scoring points; it's about representing North Brentwood with pride and possibility. He's a testament to excellence that can emerge when talent meets support: he continues to inspire future generations. Fox's journey reminds us why celebrating our own is essential to strengthening our community through shared identity and legacy.
