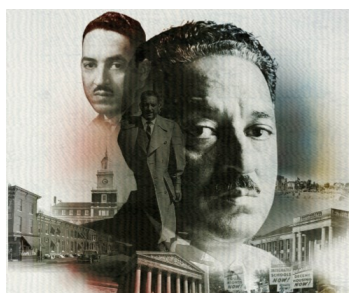

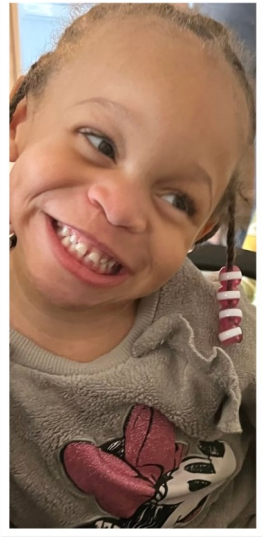

Learn about Zoey's Law



Zoey's Law requires PG County police to report all pursuits to the County Council each year, in an effort to prevent crashes like the one that took the life of Zoey Harrison (on left).

Effective as of January 1, County Council bill (CB-061-2025), called "Zoey's Law," aims to restrict police vehicle pursuits to cases involving serious felonies and violent crimes. The bill was initiated after a three year-old girl, Zoey, was killed in a car allegedly fleeing a traffic stop.

She was one of three people killed in Prince George's County within three weeks by drivers fleeing traffic stops.

The bill requires annual reporting of police vehicle pursuit data and modification of mutual aid agreements between the PGCPD and local municipalities.

The law seeks to ensure a uniform vehicle pursuit policy within the county to: improve public safety, reduce unnecessary harm, restore trust in the law, set guidelines for police pursuits and limit pursuit scenarios.

Annual Reporting

By September 1 of each year, the Chief of Police must submit a report, to the County Council, about vehicle pursuits from the prior fiscal year, including the:

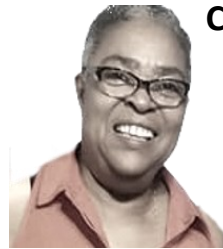
- Total number of vehicle pursuits.
- Reason for each vehicle pursuit.
- Number of vehicle pursuits ceased after initiation.
- Number of vehicle pursuits that resulted in collisions.
- Number of vehicle pursuits resulting in death or injury to an officer or member of the public.
- Number of vehicle pursuits found to be within or outside of Department policy.
- Summarized data regarding location, length and duration of vehicle pursuits.
- Suspect demographics.
- Collision damage and injuries.

Zoey's Law: Police Mutual Aid Agreements

Any mutual aid agreement (with any municipal corporation, city, town, village, or other law enforcement agency within PG County) must provide that such municipality shall adopt the minimum standards for initiating vehicle pursuits contained in the PG County Police Department General Orders.

Additionally, the County Executive shall make every reasonable effort to update each mutual aid agreement (with a municipal corporation, city, town or village) to comply with the provisions with this Act within six months of the effective date of this Act. The Act was adopted on November 17, 2025.

Winter is Still Impacting Walking and Driving In North Brentwood

Please follow the Town's Snow and Ice Procedures for snow removal, so plows can get through. The procedures document is on the next page, and it's on our Town website: northbrentwood.com/town-services.

While New Year's is over, please still keep in mind fireworks in residential communities are illegal. There have been incidents in recent months disturbing and frightening your fellow neighbors, especially elderly residents and pets. Be considerate; keep fireworks away from North Brentwood, and you'll also avoid a potential \$100 fine per violation under Town ordinances.



Town of North Brentwood Snow & Ice Procedures

Snow Removal

When snow, sleet or ice is forecasted for our area, the Town has contracted with Smallwood Ground Maintenance for snow removal. Councilman Baynes is the contact person for concerns.

At forecast of snow/ice accumulation, it is necessary for the contractor treat streets before ice formation begins. When PG County Schools are closed, the Town office will also be closed.

It is every resident's responsibility to clear snow off the sidewalks, in front of their homes, within 24 hours after the snowfall ceases.

Parking

During the Snow Emergency, the Mayor and Council require all citizens with driveways to park their vehicles **in their driveways**. This helps the contractor to clear the street properly. If you do not have a driveway, please adhere to the parking area notices and park on the correct side of each street (see chart below). *Please park right wheels to the curve.*

We know there may be concerns about blocking driveways with snow, when the snow plow comes through, but we must keep our streets clear. It is critical for all residents adhere to the rules so it is easier for all concerned. If you're able to help seniors and your neighbors, please do.

Any cars stuck in middle of the street, or parked illegally during this time, will be ticketed and towed away at owner's expense. We urge all citizens adhere to the rules and regulations provided to you at this time. North Brentwood is small and, to make sure the Mayor and Council can give you the best services, we need our residents to obey the rules. President's Day: February 16

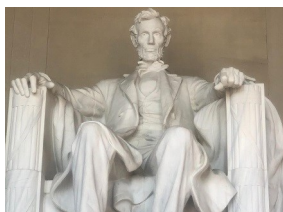


What's Open/Closed on President's Day?

Presidents' Day is a federal holiday celebrated on the third Monday in February; in 2026, it will occur on the 16th. Schools, banks, post offices, county government offices, and the stock exchange are closed on Feb 16.

Looking for a Way to Enjoy President's Day?

US National Parks will be NOT be free on Feb 16. The Trump administration announced all parks offer free admission to US residents only on President Donald Trump's birthday; five other formerly free days (e.g., President's Day) have been dropped.

Free Help with 2026 Tax Returns

- The deadline for filing federal and Maryland tax returns is Wednesday, April 15, 2026.
- Go to irs.gov/filing/individuals/when-to-file if you need to file an extension or if you're serving in the armed forces (special filing rules may apply).

The IRS's Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) and Tax Counseling for the Elderly (TCE) programs offer free basic tax return prep for some. Go to: irs.gov/individuals/free-tax-return-preparation-for-qualifying-taxpayers, to get details and learn what to bring.

The VITA program has operated sites for more than 50 years. To qualify for assistance a taxpayer must:

- Generally make \$69,000 or less (up from \$64k)
- Have a disability; and/or
- Have limited English-speaking skills

In addition to VITA, the TCE program offers free tax help, particularly for those who are 60 years of age and older. It specializes in questions about pensions and retirement-related issues unique to seniors.

While the IRS manages the VITA and TCE programs, the sites are operated by IRS partners and staffed by IRS-certified tax counseling volunteers, who are often retired individuals associated with nonprofit organizations that receive grants from the IRS.

VITA/TCE services are not only free, they are also a reliable, trusted source for preparing tax returns. All VITA/TCE volunteers, who prepare returns, must pass tax law training that meets or exceeds IRS standards, including maintaining the privacy and confidentiality of taxpayer information.

In addition to demanding volunteers to certify their knowledge of tax laws, the IRS requires a quality review check for every return prepared at a VITA/TCE site prior to filing. Each filing season, tens of thousands of dedicated VITA/TCE volunteers prepare millions of federal and state returns. They also assist taxpayers with the preparation of thousands of Facilitated Self-Assistance returns.

Route 1 Group: Food for Immigrant Families

This is an edited version of Alison Beckwith's article, which appeared in Hyattsville Wire on January 26.



An informal group of Route 1 residents has been delivering groceries, to immigrant families worried about going out in public amid a mass deportation effort by the Trump admin.

At the end of October 2025, Route 1 Mutual Aid spun off from the Route 1 Corridor chapter of the grassroots democracy organization “Indivisible” — with the goal of helping families affected by the government shutdown.

After starting as the “Feeding Task Force,” the group changed its name to address a broader range of crises.

When the shutdown ended, Route 1 Mutual Aid shifted its focus to assist dozens of immigrant families, which continues today. The group provides weekly grocery deliveries supported by in-kind donations, partnerships with local organizations, and community donations.

Stephanie DeLorenzo, a Hyattsville resident who helped start the group, told the *Wire* its internal listserv now has 200 email addresses, but dozens of others volunteer and donate consistently through other email lists, Facebook groups and Instagram.

Route 1 Mutual Aid currently partners with the Prince George’s and Montgomery County Immigrants Rights Collectives, which provide services to residents who have had at least one family member detained by US Immigration and Customs Enforcement.

The Route 1 group also partners with Prince George’s Community College, to help students taking ESOL, GED and citizenship classes. (Denizens Brewing Co. and Vigilante Coffee serve as donation drop sites.)

As well, the group has a “Porch Ambassador” program for people who want to run mini food drives.

Route 1 Mutual Aid originally planned to run until February, as a short-term program, but those involved recently decided to continue running its programs at least through this month. Become a PG County CASA

You can change a child’s story by becoming a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA): a trained adult who represents/advocates for a child’s best interests in the child protection system. Obligation includes:

- **Time Commitment.** 7-12 or 10-15 hours/month.
- **Duration.** At least one year or until the case closes.
- **Responsibilities.** Lead independent investigations, report findings to the court and meet child’s needs.

To become a CASA in PG County, you must: be at least 21, attend an info session, submit an application, pass a background check, complete up to 37 training hours, and commit to 7 to 15 hours monthly for at least one year. The County hosts bi-weekly info sessions. Learn more at pgcasa.org/volunteer/become-a-volunteer or send an email to: volunteer@pgcasa.org.

Notes from Recent Town Meetings



The Mayor and Town Council meet the first and third Monday each month via Zoom at 7:30 pm. North Brentwood residents are encouraged to attend and get involved!

The January 5, 2026 meeting began with Mayor Robinson addressing the community, wishing peace and unity for Town residents and outlining key priorities for 2026 — including economic development along Route 1 and PG's African American Museum reopening efforts.

Mayor Robinson encouraged Council members to consider their 2026 priorities and to prepare for budget discussions, noting the challenging financial situation. They also discussed the need to engage with politicians, to better understand candidates' goals and intentions.

The January 20, 2026 meeting largely focused on ongoing litigation with the Prince George's African American Museum and Cultural Center, including discussions about fiduciary duties and potential resolution efforts.

The Mayor and Council also reviewed Town projects and initiatives, such as grants, property improvements and safety measures, while addressing concerns about snow removal and upcoming utility work. Conversation included updates about police department agreements, resident engagement, volunteer opportunities and Black History Month (BHM). The Town will celebrate BHM with a different event each Saturday in February, at North Brentwood Community Center.

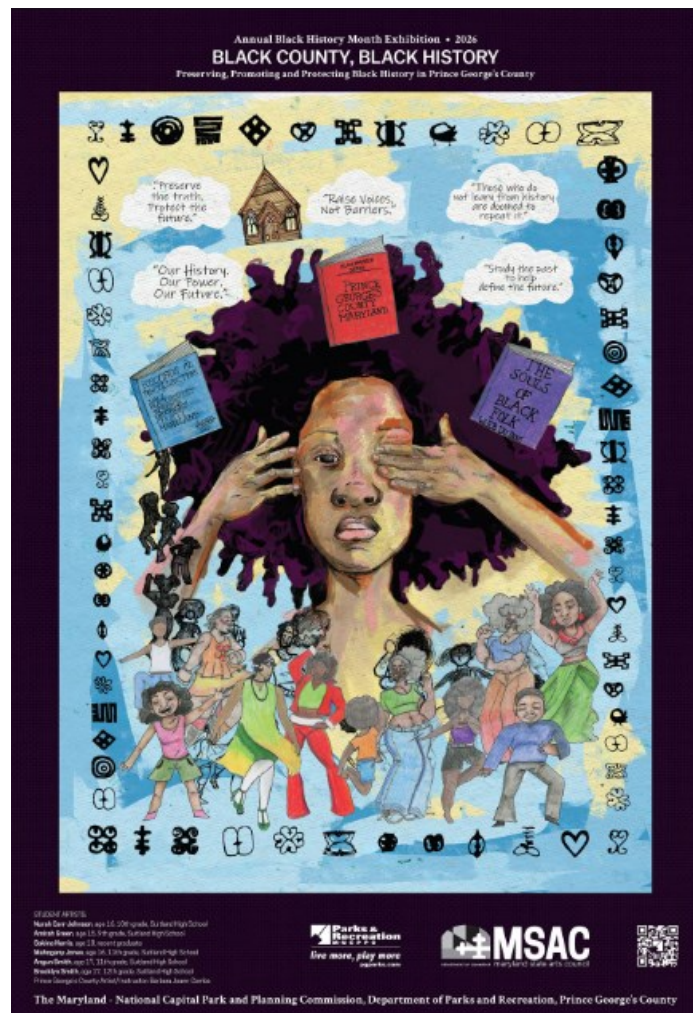


Delegate Fennell's fundraiser was held in Annapolis on January 12th.

Daniel Armano Jones, a 26-year-old health care policy advocate, is seeking election to the County Council's District 2 seat. (The seat is currently held by Wanika Fisher until December 2026; she is running for State's Attorney.)



At the January 5th Town Meeting, Jones told of his background in public service, policy advocacy and community engagement; he spoke about MLK, Jr. and the importance of community service. He outlined priorities, including: storm water management, economic development for small businesses, education support, affordability, public safety, housing security, and a commitment to collaborating with community youth.



I Got the Shot... Why Do I Have the Flu?

If you got the flu shot in fall 2025, why did you get the flu this winter? The current H3N2 subclade K strain was not specifically targeted in the fall 2025 flu shot. H3N2 emerged later and wasn't known when vaccine strains were selected in early 2025, creating a mismatch.

As of early January, Maryland had "very high" influenza rates. Now, while the "severe" flu surge around the holidays may be dropping, be wary: so far, this flu season, 4,200 have been hospitalized and 14 have died.

What is more, data shows Black individuals, particularly children ages 0-4, have higher rates of severe, influenza associated hospitalizations compared to others.



Per the CDC, in general, flu hospitalization rates are nearly 80% higher among Black people compared to white people, 30% higher among Native Americans, and 20% higher among Hispanic populations.

Last year's season didn't peak until February. Health experts still strongly recommend getting the flu vaccine for protection against severe illness from subclade K and other circulating viruses such as H1N1 and B strains.

"We're seeing a bad flu season," said Dr. Georges Benjamin, Executive Director of the American Public Health Association.

"It's not too late to get your flu shot.... People who are symptomatic should not go to work or school, they should stay home," he said. "And then you do all the other things: washing your hands frequently and wearing a mask when you're around others and have symptoms."

Andrew Pekosz, a Johns Hopkins School of Public Health professor who researches respiratory illnesses, hopes the flu surge continues to drop.

"The initial signs that we are seeing here is that it's a steep flu season, but it seems to be going away as quickly as it came," Pekosz said. "I caution that every flu season is a little bit different, and there are two influenza viruses – we call them H1N1 and Influenza B virus – that can cause influenza. And it's not uncommon to see a late-season surge with a different type of influenza."

But... What about COVID-19?

This year's flu deaths, while high, are still trailing far behind another severe seasonal respiratory illness – COVID-19. In the 2025-26 respiratory illness season, COVID has been responsible for 99 deaths this year. That's significant because state data shows current COVID-19 activity is "low" though it is increasing.

"When you look at COVID-19 numbers, there still is a significant danger of severe illness that is sometimes much higher than what we see for influenza," Pekosz said. "So, while we don't see as much COVID right now, it's still a disease that is dangerous, if not maybe a little bit more dangerous, than influenza. Particularly in the high-risk groups."

Those high-risk groups include people who are over the age of 65 and immunocompromised people.

Pekosz says for COVID and the flu, regular hand washing and staying home when sick help to prevent the spread. Antivirals are also available for those who get sick to protect from severe illness. He also urged people to get vaccinated and wear masks around others when experiencing symptoms.

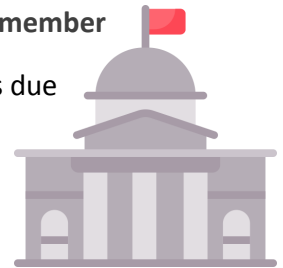
Now in its 26th year, Maryland Municipal League's annual "If I Were Mayor, I Would..." essay contest is its oldest ambassador program of its kind.

- Apoyo a eventos locales, negocios e iniciativas comunitarias.

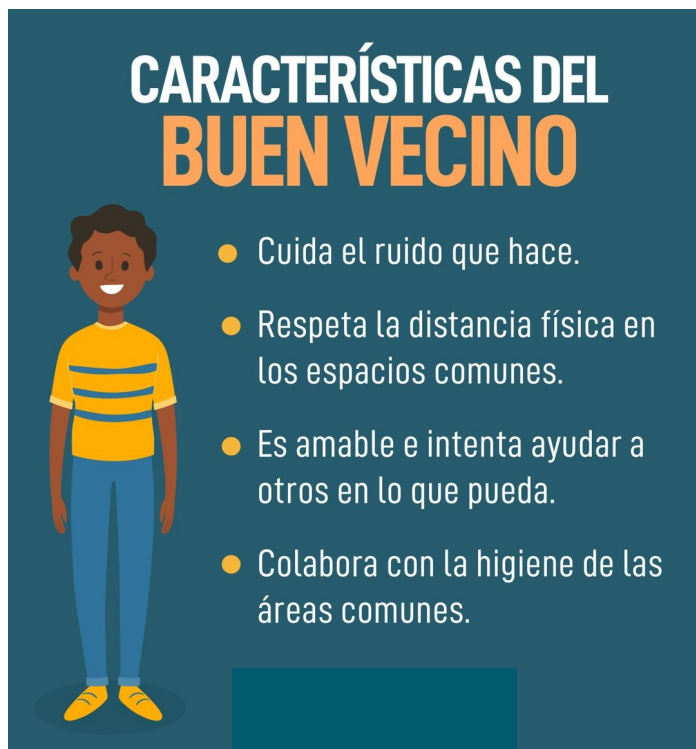
Estas pueden parecer acciones pequeñas, pero juntas crean un impacto poderoso.
