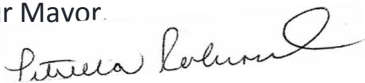
The older I become, the more I appreciate that the good old days were not just about the places we lived or the events we attended.

Town of North Brentwood proudly joined the communities of College Park, Riverdale Park, Hyattsville, Brentwood, and Mount Rainier, on Saturday, June 13, to celebrate Trolley Day.

The annual event highlights Rhode Island Avenue Trolley Trail's growing connection to the region's trail network. Our hub was located in Entrepreneur Park.

North Brentwood's trail stop was organized by Evan Dame, Councilmember and VP of the North Brentwood Historical Society, with support NBHS members: Diane Braddock, President; Jackie Morales, Treasurer; Robbin Queen, Secretary, and Una Palmer.



Visitors explored North Brentwood's rich history through photographs of residents past and present.



A highlight of the day was the participation of Stefan Woehlke, from University of MD's School of Architecture, Planning and Preservation. Woehlke displayed artifacts uncovered during the 2022 archaeological dig at the site of the Henry Randall

House (built in 1892); he discussed ongoing research conducted by his students.



In addition to activities offered at stops along the Route 1 Corridor, North Brentwood's local businesses provided unique contributions:

- Material Things Studio's hands-on clay activity delighted families all day.
- Dr. Cecil Boyd, of African American Café, offered a generous 20% discount on food for Trolley Trail-goers.



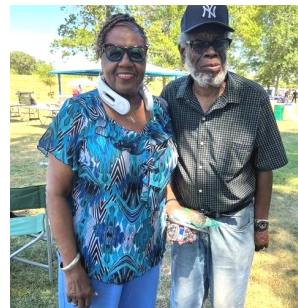

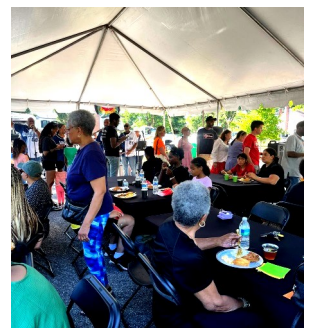


Juneteenth in North Brentwood

Mayor's Message about MML Conference 2026

As Mayor of North Brentwood, I'm proud to share our Public Works team represented the Town at this year's Maryland Municipal League Conference in Ocean City.

MML remains the only statewide organization composed exclusively of municipal officials and dedicated to strengthening every branch of municipal administration. Through its advocacy, education, and information-sharing, MML ensures that Maryland's municipal leaders and staff have resources to deliver exceptional service to our communities.

This year, Greg Butler and Anthony Avents attended a specialized course offered by the Maryland Municipal Public Works Officials Association. The training



provided an invaluable opportunity to deepen their expertise, learn directly from subject matter experts, and build relationships with colleagues from municipalities across the state.

During the session, they examined practical strategies for sourcing projects efficiently: approaches that help save time and taxpayer dollars. The team also gained insight into how well-crafted contracts can prevent delays and keep essential projects on track. This training directly informs how our Public Works team performs every day on behalf of North Brentwood.

One of the key takeaways was the benefits of mutual aid. In an environment where state/federal emergency funding is never guaranteed, municipalities must be prepared to rely on one another. Understanding how to coordinate with neighboring towns (with capacity to assist during crises) is essential to maintaining continuity of operations and protecting our residents.

The team also strengthened their project management skills, learning techniques to ensure municipal projects are delivered on time, within scope, and are aligned with the Town's long-term vision. Equally important,

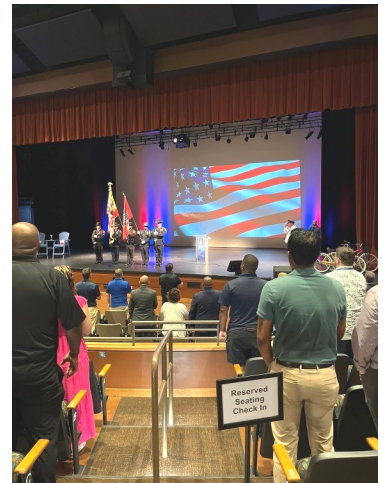
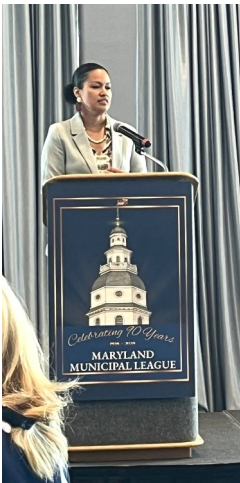

Our Town's investment in professional development is a future asset. The knowledge gained at MML will support more efficient operations, stronger regional partnerships, and improved service delivery for our community.

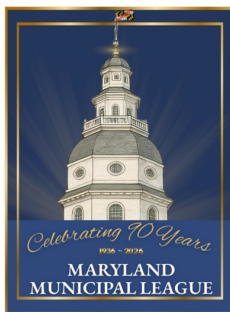

Pepco's June Price Increase Explained

FROM PEPCO—As temperatures rise, so does demand for electricity. Pepco is committed to supporting our customers during a time of higher energy bills, while still maintaining safety and keeping lights on across Maryland. Part of our commitment is transparency — and we're here to help customers understand seasonal changes to their monthly bill. A bill is broken down between supply (things that generate the actual power, like a power plant) and distribution (things that deliver the actual energy, like power lines).

Starting June 1, customers saw a few changes:

\$13 electric PJM supply increase: compared to summer 2025. **It is important to note that Pepco does not generate electricity or set supply prices.** This is the cost of the electricity itself, which Pepco passes through to customers at cost. Each year, Pepco buys electricity for customers through competitive auctions with wholesale suppliers. The new SOS rates reflect the results of this year's auction, approved by the MD Public Service Commission. Demand for energy in our region is growing, while available supply decreased, contributing to higher supply costs.

\$7 surcharge increase: compared to summer 2025 due to EmPOWER Maryland surcharge changes and other local taxes. EmPOWER MD supports energy efficiency programs and helps customers save energy and money: maryland.gov/Pages/Facts/empower.aspx.

Your distribution charge will also switch to summer rates. This rate, which appears in the "delivery" part of your bill will **remain the same as last summer**, but summer rates are higher than the winter rates.

Summer Energy Savings Tips

- Close curtains to block out sun/keep rooms cool.
- Raise thermostat by 1 degree to save up to 3%.
- Wash laundry in cold water when you can.
- Turn off unneeded lights/appliances giving off heat.

Ms. Eleanor F. Traynham (a legend in North Brentwood) passed away on June 28, 2026 in Florida.

There will be a Memorial Service on Friday, July 31, at New Mount Nebo Baptist Church, at 7501 Walker Mill Rd, Capitol Heights. Church opens at 10 am; service begins at 11 am.

We extend our deepest sympathy to her family, who are also significant parts of North Brentwood history.

North Brentwood proudly recognizes Eleanor Traynham's legacy; she was a devoted public servant whose commitment helped strengthen our community for many years. Mrs. Traynham faithfully served the Town as a **Councilmember**, and later as **Town Clerk**, where she was known for her professionalism, integrity and dedication to preserving the business and history of North Brentwood.

Through years of service, she helped Town government remain responsive, organized and focused on the needs of its residents. Beyond her official duties, Eleanor Traynham was a community builder – instrumental in establishing and supporting local organizations that bring neighbors together, encourage civic participation, and preserve the rich heritage of North Brentwood.

Her leadership reflected a deep love for the Town and a belief that strong communities are built through service and collaboration.

Eleanor Traynham's contributions continue to inspire those who serve today. Her legacy reminds us that lasting change is often achieved through quiet dedication, steadfast leadership, and an unwavering commitment to community versus just one's self or family.

The Town of North Brentwood is grateful for Eleanor F. Traynham's years of faithful service and honors her as one of the many individuals whose leadership helped shape the history and future of our remarkable Town.

Arthur J. Dock Honored on 95th Birthday

North Brentwoodians gathered, on June 28, for a surprise party to celebrate the 95th birthday of Town icon Arthur J. Dock — North Brentwood's 13th Mayor and one of its most influential educators.

Mr. Dock was born in Washington, DC in 1931 and raised in North Brentwood. He served as Mayor from 1993 to 1995 and remains a beloved figure whose impact continues to shape the community.

Friends, neighbors, colleagues, classmates, former students, and Godchildren gathered to honor a man whose influence spans generations. Among them was Bettye Queen, Dock's classmate from Lakeland High School's last graduating class; she helped recognize his lifelong commitment to learning and service.

A Teacher Who Made a Difference

Six former students from Dock's years teaching at Sojourner Truth attended the celebration, sharing heartfelt stories of his dedication. Their remarks made it clear Mr. Dock instilled discipline, pride and a strong sense of self-worth in his students — qualities that stayed with them long after leaving his classroom.

A Resolution of Appreciation

Mayor Petrella Robinson presented Mr. Dock with a resolution acknowledging his service as an educator, mentor, veteran, and civic leader: his contributions to North Brentwood has shaped many lives in our Town.

Tributes from Fellow Educators

The sons of renowned educator Joseph Parker also attended the party, describing Dock as "super smart," a "scientific intellectual," and a teacher who cared deeply about student success. One son recalled struggling with a science project until Mr. Dock arrived at his home with everything needed to create a standout submission that later appeared in *The Washington Post*. They also fondly noted his exceptional typing skills, which kept him from combat during his service in the United States Army.

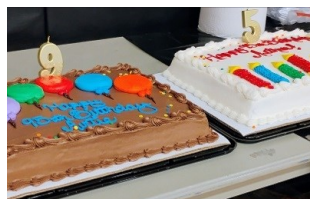
A Godfather's Devotion

Tre Coatley spoke movingly about the depth of Dock's commitment to others: he helped raise (and continues to guide and support) five generations of his family.

A Legacy Celebration

The program was organized in part by the Hayes family and Debbie Bellows, former Councilmember and granddaughter of former Mayor William J. Bellows (1967–1999). Their involvement underscored the continuity of leadership and the enduring pride shared across generations in North Brentwood.

The gathering was more than a birthday party — it was a tribute to a man who has given so much to North Brentwood. As attendees reflected, Arthur J. Dock's legacy is one of scholarship, service, mentorship, and unwavering dedication to the community he loves.

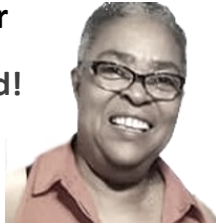

Mosquito Control

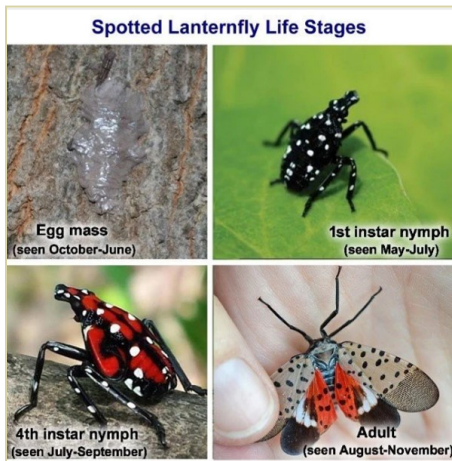


North Brentwood is participating in the cooperative mosquito control program with the Maryland Department of Agriculture this year!

- Larviciding (spraying) runs through September/early October, once per week, Monday to Friday, between 8 am and 4:30 pm.
- To reduce mosquito populations, empty standing water in your yard: birdbaths, trash can lids, etc.

Remove Invasive Spotted Lantern Flies

If you see little black or red bugs with white spots (or fully grown with wings) on your trees, act quickly:



lanternflies thrive on tree sap. Inject systemic insecticide directly into a tree or drench trunk soil. Home remedies include dish soap vinegar,

solutions, or neem oil on trees and soil.

Affordable Eye Exams this Summer

The Prevention of Blindness Society (POB) of Metro Washington has a **Summer Eye Exam Program** at their DC office. This may be a helpful referral option for patients who need access to an affordable eye exam.

POB is offering eye exams, by appointment, for people ages 5 to 100. They accept many forms of DC, Maryland, and Virginia Medicaid. Eye exams are \$40 for self-pay patients. Eyeglasses are not included in the exam fee, but basic eyeglasses, including single vision and bifocals, start at \$40, including frames.

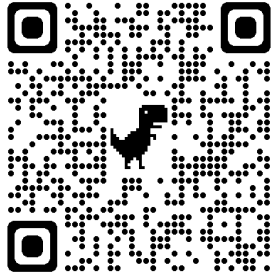

Vote on Redistricting in MD

Annapolis lawmakers will reconvene, August 3-5, for a special session to vote on legislation proposing a state constitutional amendment for congressional redistricting standards.

The measure needs three-fifths approval from MD's Senate and House of Delegates to advance. If passed, it will appear on the November General Election ballot. State Senate President Bill Ferguson said changes to the Voting Rights Act "created new uncertainty around congressional redistricting."

Town of North Brentwood Announces Traffic Calming Improvements on Allison Street

Keeping Our Neighborhood Safe



The Mayor and Town Council of North Brentwood are committed to protecting the safety and well-being of our residents, pedestrians and visitors.

As part of this commitment, the Town intends to install **speed humps along Allison Street** to address ongoing public safety concerns related to excessive speeding and motorists failing to stop at posted stop signs.

Over the past several months, the Town Office has received concerns from residents regarding unsafe driving behavior on Allison Street. Excessive speeds and repeated stop sign violations create unnecessary risks for families, children, pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists traveling through the neighborhood.

Why Speed Humps?

Traffic calming measures, such as speed humps, are widely recognized as an effective way to:

- Reduce vehicle speeds in residential neighborhoods.
- Improve pedestrian safety.
- Encourage compliance with stop signs and other traffic control devices and signage.
- Enhance the overall quality of life for residents by creating safer streets.



Installation of speed humps is intended to encourage drivers to slow down, and operate vehicles more safely while traveling through our community.

What Residents Can Expect

The Town will work with a qualified contractor to install the speed humps in accordance with applicable engineering standards.

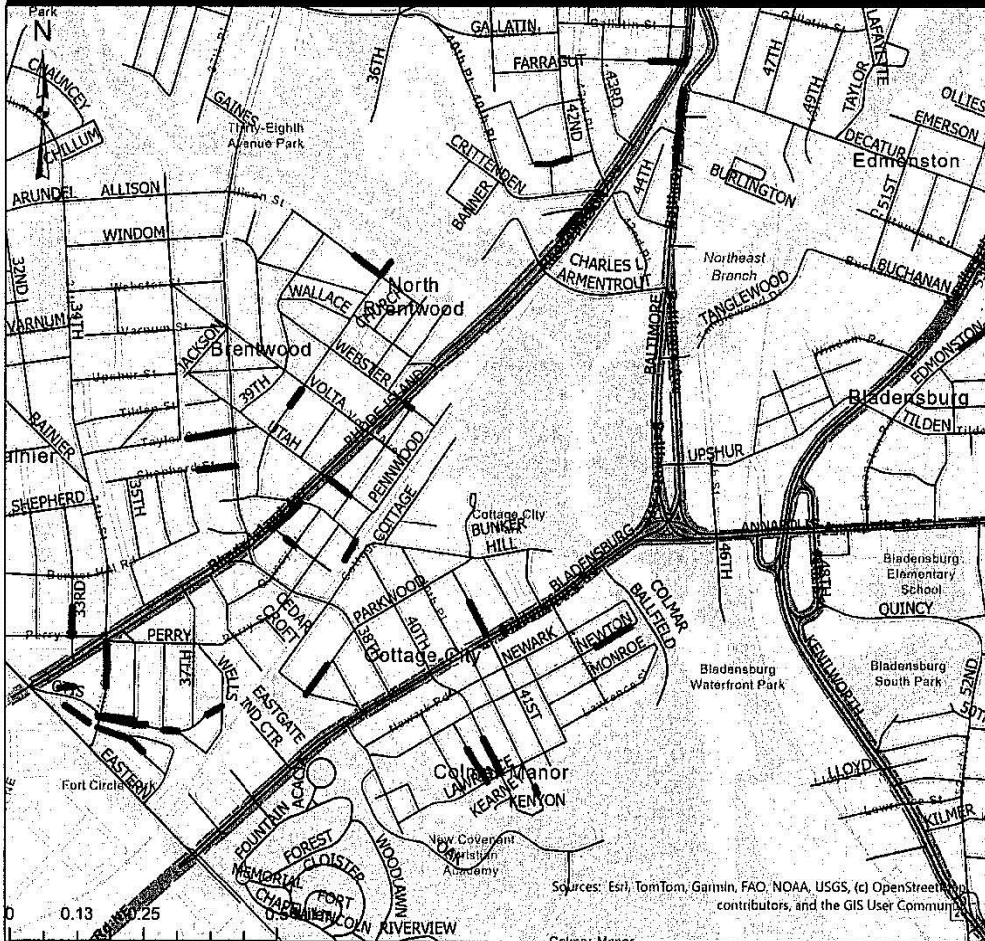

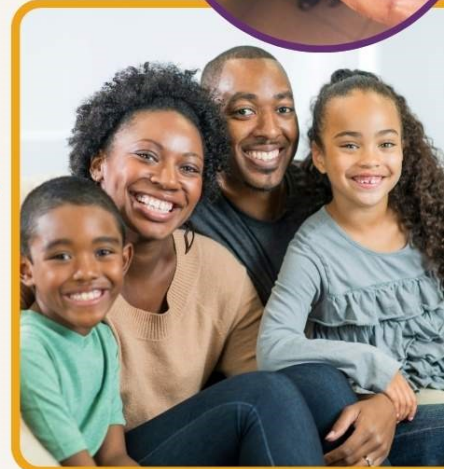

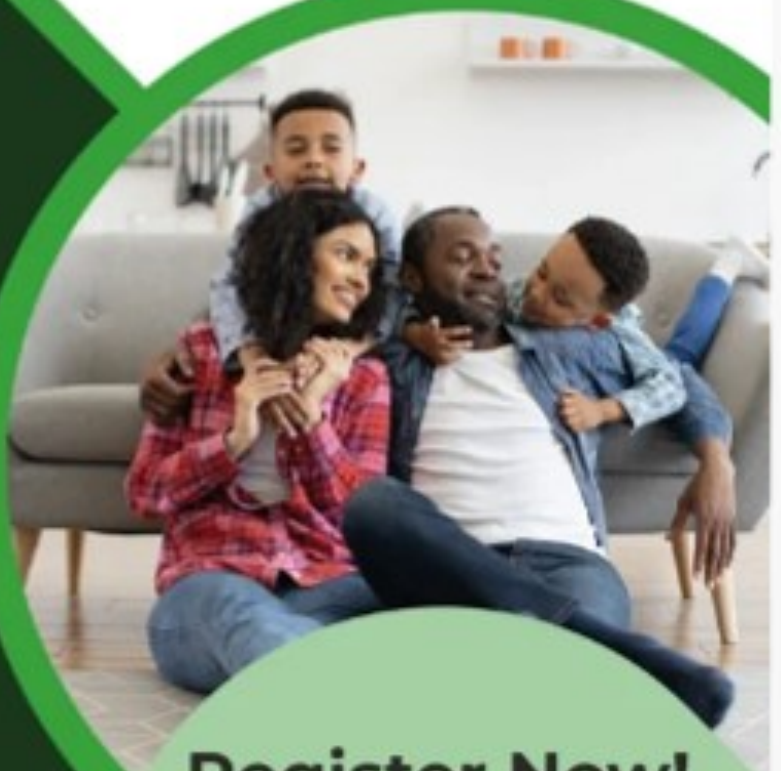
